GCSE Sociology

Course content and overview

The WJEC GCSE in Sociology is designed to develop pupils' understanding and critical awareness of the social world around them. The course focuses on the importance of social structure in explaining social issues. Pupils will be encouraged to explore and debate contemporary social issues to enable them to challenge taken-for-granted assumptions and to question their everyday understanding of social phenomena. By following this course, pupils will develop their own sociological awareness through active engagement with the contemporary social world.

Sociology requires pupils to apply their sociological knowledge, understanding and skills to develop an understanding of relationships and tension between social structures and individual agency within a UK and global context. Critically analyse information and use evidence in order to make informed arguments, reach substantiated judgements and draw conclusions. Use and apply their knowledge and understanding of how social structures and processes influence social control, power and inequality. Use sociological theories to understand social issues, debates, social changes and continuities over time. Understand and evaluate sociological methodology and a range of research methods. Use sociological terminology appropriately and make connections between the key areas of subject content.

Pupils will sit two examinations in Year 11.

Assessment: Component 1: Understanding Social Processes Written examination: 1 hour 45 minutes 50% of qualification 100 marks.

Component 1:

This component focuses on the themes of socialisation, identity and culture. Pupils study the key concepts and processes of cultural transmission, including socialisation and the acquisition of identity, and develop these through detailed study of families and education.

Assessment: Component 2: Understanding Social Structures Written examination: 1 hour 45 minutes 50% of qualification 100 marks

Component 2:

The focus in this component is on social differentiation, power and stratification. This includes the theme of power, issues of social order and social control, studied through crime and deviance. Pupils also study applied methods of sociological enquiry
